There was a Rosh Yeshiva once visiting Jewish inmates in a jail and arranged a minyan for scharis. Towards the end of the tefila one of the inmates started taking off his tefilin during uva lezion. After davening the RY approached the inmate and asked him what was your rush, where do you have to go? You're in jail, there's nowhere to go!

Sometimes we do things so habitual it stays with us forever without even thinking about it.

A similar story is said about the Satmar Rav (I think). A badchan once asked him permission to impersonate him for a skit being done for a chasana or Purim. The Rav agreed. While pretending to act like the Satmar Rav, the badchan noticed tears running down the Rav's face. The badchan felt so awful and horrified and afterwards immediately went to ask for mechila. The Rav explained that he wasn't crying because he was being made fun of. He was crying watching himself act every day. He realized that each day he simply mimics what he did the day before.

Often we end up davening by rote, without much emotions and just mimic what we've been doing for years. Especially during these yemi ratzon we should strive to make our tefilos meaningful and not just another routine and habit.
