In their lingo, do you believe that your lust makes your life unmanageable and that you are powerless over it, or not? If yes, then you are an addict - as far as AA/SA members are concerned - and can freely borrow their program of recovery.

There is no 'mitzvah' nor *anything* inherently good about believing you *are* an addict, as there is no religion called "recovery"! The ones who do believe that about themselves are only the lucky ones if they are right, not if they are wrong. Then they are just barking up the wrong tree and never get clean, anyhow.

It is purely a question of what *you* believe are the facts about yourself. No one has any business hoping or trying to convince you of anything here, as far as I am concerned.
