

Reb Ano - I agree that clearly, the girl has issues in the relationship with her father. but here's the thing - she has a whole community of people with whom she can comfortably share the most intimate aspects of her life, which she ordinarily would have trouble telling her closest friend. And depending on the situation, you have a whole community of angry teens encouraging her, and tellign her that it's GOOD for her to be angry at her father.

Sometimes, a person needs to be able to talk about things, and a blog can offer a great outlet. But all too often, it serves as an easy platform for people to air their anti-torah views (though of course they claim that they're supporting the way that judaism is "supposed" to be, unlike the way all those old rabbis think), and for others to support them. Kinda like porn online - it was always around, but now, with the internet, it's easier to access, so more people get involved.
