The accepting of all types and stripes is not the problem. Rather, their belief that we can *act* on our feelings/desires, no matter the cost, (for each person its different) is the problem. Since I am Jewish, I can't use my feelings to go against the torah. For someone that is not religious, the same applies. As an example. Just because you feel like a girl, that doesn't mean you can come into my bathroom if I'm uncomfortable, that's against my safety and frankly against my rights. Just because someone desires SSA, it doesn't mean, I cant say unequivocally, "i will not help you in your sinful actions, even though you feel that way" (like the example of the Colorado woman who was sued for not suppling 2 SSA guys with a wedding cake.) Even though you feel that way, its against my religious rights.

In other words, the premise that we should accept all people as the same, regardless of their feelings/desires [including sexual desires] i think is great and not a problem at all.

The problem with modern sexual attitudes is the belief, that when a decision has to be made between respecting truth/beliefs or desire/feelings, that desires/feelings are always more important then truths and beliefs. To the extent, that modern progressivism ignores the truth in situations that hurt people, in order to listen to feelings. An example of this is trans woman playing sports with real woman. Since it is not true that a trans woman is really a woman, (s) he is then taking advantage of real woman in a painful way. Real woman spend years practicing for track, sport, swimming etc, only to learn that they lost everything, because they are no longer remotely the best, since a man who feels like a woman, who has higher level of muscle and testosterone, is putting them out of the limelight. Another example is gender affirming surgery, which is pure child abuse in a sick way, excused, because "hay that's the way they feel". What happens when this teen grows a little older and realizes he/she made a teenage mistake, which we all do, because teenage mistakes are expected? The now mature adult is deformed for life now, because some politician said her feelings matter more then her life itself. Its dumb, ridiculous, and sick. Poor teens that make that decision. Imagine being a 22 yr old, and realizing that a decision you made when you were 16, has now ruined your life for good. No wonder the highest rate of suicide amongst any group in the US are people that have transformed.

And the same issue plays out when there is desire vs belief. We have the same issue here. Yes, all desires should be able to be shared without judgment, without being called sick with a "disease" (which is a factual lie, disease in the mental illness field is just a cluster of symptoms and not an actual disease) and with acceptance of the person as a regular human being just like me and you. But, does that mean someone should act on their feelings which goes against their beliefs? We believe no. They believe yes. I'm a religious Jew, I'm not allowed to be in the same bathroom as females. I can sympathize with your gender dysphoria, but you can't decide that I have to do your bidding, and consider you a woman and allow you into a men's restroom if that goes against my religion. I can sympathize with your SSA desires, but you cant tell me, "you must cater my SSA wedding" if it goes against my religious beliefs.

To sum it up. Feelings matter. Matter hugely. We must accept everyone as one of us, regardless of feelings. But *only* feelings matter? At expense of beliefs, religious rights, child rights and human rights? Nope. And very very nope. I can desire SSA, but I cant act on it. And that's because my religion says I can't. The modern sexual attitude disagrees. *And unfortunately, no matter the catastrophic hurt, abuse, neglect, damage destruction and devastation caused here in America by those who advocate the modern sexual attitude, those same people just push forward, destroying, hurting and ultimately abusing humanity.*

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
