Absolutely, IT - but first of all, I think that the natural tendency is for us to always think we're ready to move on before we actually are (unless we have a fear issue). I know people who had hashkafos that were krum (certainly by the value system of their own yeshiva), yet refused to

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ask about it, because they "had already picked up the hashkafa of their rabbeim. This, on a major issue, at the ripe old age of 20.

Secondly, I think that everything has it's own level. As I pointed out, some issues are more complex than others, and some have so many different variables and things that make us "nogei'a b'davar" (how do I say that in english?) that it's close to impossible for us to be sure that we're making a balanced decision. As we get better and better, and learn more (about torah, and ourselves), we can handle more and more complex situations.
