Well... not necessarily. There are many commandments that we keep, even though they are not self destructive, in order to serve hashem. For example, masturbation. It is arguably a "healthy"

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behaviour but we try to limit ourselves because hashem commands us not to. P in the other hand is arguably a self destructive behaviour but we try to limit ourselves because that is God's will. So we are serving ourselves BUT our main incentive to stop is because it is hashem's will (the proof to this is that most secular people don't think twice about it even though it is morally questionable while we are here struggling).
