The correct analogy here is not to a choleh. The correct analogy is someone who is a captive in a situation were he cant do mitzvos ex russia. It is permitted to be mechalel shabbos. A addict is in prison. If he acts out he is being put in the prison of his addiction.

I agree that there are numerous Halachic bases to permit this. Two other grounds to be lenient are that we often permit a shvus d'shvus in a case of hefsed merubah, and in a case of bitul oneg Shabbos. Losing sobriety is no less serious than a large monetary loss (indeed, it's much more serious), and would cause a major bitul of oneg Shabbos.

I can't say that it's exactly similar, but I learned through the sugya with a very big posek in regard to a situation of being mechalel Shabbos to save yourself from doing other aveiros.

Two other sources to see are the Shulchan Aruch at the end of siman ?"? and at the end of ??? in Orach Chaim that discuss about saving someone else from issur.

Here is what I seem to have understood; not sure if the question here was for the person themselves, or even to help them.

Obviously, if we can consider it imminent pikuach nefesh, there is no question.

If it is not, then you get into the question of which issur is worse- and that would depend on how he's planning on acting out. If it is masturbation, Shabbos is more chamur)see the Shulchan Aruch Even Haezer siman ?? where the ezer mikodesh there says issur kareis is worse than masturbation).

However, then you would get into the question of the fact that he will end up masurbating many times, and would only be mechalel one Shabbos. That is a question brought down in siman ??"? about feeding a choleh less of an issur kal or more of an issur chamur.

Then of course you have the possible heterim above of making it a shvus dshvus, treating electricity not as a deoraisa, etc. See siman ???? ???? for what a Jew can do for a choleh.

In regard to answering his call, there the sugya in Shabbos seems to make it dependent on whether the person you are trying to help was negligent and that is how they got into this in the first place.

Just some thoughts, obviously nothing Halacha lemaaseh. I would love to hear what a posek says. Will try to ask one this week.
