Many "frum" people dress a lot less Tznius than non frum women, and as the Gemara says, they will need to give a Din V'Cheshbon for dressing in a way that makes you or anyone else have Hirhurim Ra'im or worse.

Tznius is more than just covering the elbows, knees and kneck. Often these areas are covered, but the dress is so tight thatthe entire form is visible; this is 100% Asur Al Pi Halacha. And those

who dress this way or encourage/allow their wives/daughters to dress this way will need to give a Din V'Cheshbon as well.

Your job is to avoid these areas where you know you will be exposed to these sites. If it is a place that is frequented by "frum" people who don't take Tznius seriously and don't care for the word of Hashem, YOU don't belong there.

May Hashem continue to give you the strength to be the boss of your eyes and mind, as there is no greater gift in the world!
