ben-moshe - you really inspired me with that piece. You're a true warrier for hashem - tumah all around you, and not even one bad move - you're literally keeping the world in existence. I can place myself mamesh in your shoes(on a good day, when I actually try and beat the menuval) - no one else knows the wars we go through daily. With me it's not wal-mart; it's just walking down the street! On my street, there's a video store with a big banner saying 'pornography sale' - plus, there's this pritzusdige psychic fortune teller lady who keeps talking to me when I pass by that for some reason I keep thinking about. It's different with her because she's actually talking to me, making herself impressed on my mind more than an impersonal sight of a prutzah on the street - the social aspect of it makes it a lot harder, but that's what the yatzer hora feeds on, vulnerabilities - in my case im vulnerable in that im not too sociable; I dont have a lot of friends, and the ones I do have im not that close with - looking back on when I used to watch shmutz, I think it may have been more due to the excitement of the energy the prutzos expressed on the videos than anything - I craved excitement. But ketzosen are more exciting! I have no idea how i'll be able to talk to prutzos in work or something if I ever need to - im terrified. Baruch hashem im still in yeshiva!

Those magazines are ALWAYS at the check-out it's s good mussar haskel though - it's a reminder that even when we think we're done fighting, we always have to have our guard up. As my rebbe says, there's no word for 'fair' in lashon hakodesh. If you ever noticed little israeli boys talking, they say 'ze lo fair'! since there's no word for it even in modern ivrit. What does this mean? It means the concept of 'fair' the way we see it doesn't exist, since if it has no word in hebrew, it's meaningless. There's justice, yashrus, etc.. but no concept of fair, as in, fair by my own definition.

P.S. what's the problem of ain odom maysim atzmo larasha? All he wants to do is asser some

meat on himself, or his wife in the case of the gemora altz pesach pasuach - how is that making himself a rasha in beis din?
