This reminds me of the tragic story of "The Volpe". The Baal Hatanya responded, "By Deer Kricht a Vermul" meaning by you is crawling a worm.

Unfortunately soon afterwards, the Volpe fell hard. He started to drink heavily and became an alchoholic. He left the chabura and was never seen for years.
