I just read something and I wanted to share it.

The three weeks and Tisha Ba'av are coming up.

In the Michtav Me'eliyahu, Rav Dessler says that the true separation of the shechinah from the Jewish people is not demonstrated by the ruin of the Beis Hamikdosh. The destruction was only a symptom and sign of the fact that the Jewish people have already severed the connection attaching Hakodosh baruch hu to their hearts.

He writes that recognition of hashem in a person's heart is the definition of hashem dwelling amongst Klal yisroel. It says V'shachanti besocham, the torah is intimating "besocham", within **them**, not "besocho", among **him**- *within each and every individual Yid.* 

There can be a severance of connection , a galus of the Shechinah, from each individual jew , and also a galus of the shechinah from the entire Jewish people... c"v. When this state spreads throughout the nation , then that is churban.

This is the churban we should be crying for.

He goes on to say; If someone feels pain due to his lack of attachment to Hashem, and the pain is so profound it brings him to tears, then he has already achieved a reattachment between himself and HaKadosh Baruch Hu.

This has given me a nechama.

The Torah tells us clearly "TACHIN LAHEM ES HADERECH" prepare proper signage so that one who needs to escape to the city of refuge can find his way without having to pull in to a gas station and say ' uhh uh I just killed someone do you know where I can find the local AREY MIKLAT??

Now here is the interesting thing by the mitzvah of aliya liregel we are told that there where no signs how to get to Yerushalayim. Interesting does that mean we are trying to help a murderer more than the t holy Jew on his way to the Bais MaMikdash??
