Reb gamliel rabinovitch in his sefer on the megila has a moiridake vort. The possuk says "b'erev he ba'a uvaboker he shovo el bais hanoshim. Erev is a reference to the times when a person is in a state of darkness and boker is the state of light(clarity). The possuk starts with darkness and ends with light as the gemora and zohar states there is only light for one who has come from darkness. A person thinks that when he is in a state of darkness he is far from hashem but the possuk is teaching us that at the time of erev at the time of terrible nefilos and difficult nisyonos that is exactly when it is fitting for him to come to hashem (b'erev he ba'a is referering to the neshomo coming to hashem)more so than when he is flying high in his avoda. That's when he creates the greatest nachas ruach within the battle that he battling I'maan hashem. That is what his neshomo was sent down here to contend with. I am not doing justice to the shtikel.
