Nechshavnu katzon...I was born like a sweet lamb . Very innocent, loved life, and had it all made so that I can lead a beautiful life in the green fields of this world. Great parents (though no one is perfect), lovely siblings, and the best schools set to educate me.

Latevach yuval.....at the age of 7 or 8 you allowed my life to screech into a thunders crash by allowing people that were trusted to care and protect me to violate me. The human you created (the perfect little lamb with a special neshomo and the most beautiful heart) would be ripped to small shreds ,and would be re-shaped into a bruised, injured, and pained lamb that would scream in silence for years .

Welcome brother!

Your story is deeply touching, frightening, and inspiring. First, I am inspired by your continued relationship with Hashem. It defies explanation how people can be so selfishly cruel to innocent children. I once heard a shiur by R' Motti Berger entitled "Where was G-d in the Holocaust." He basically said that once Hashem created man with free choice, he could choose to be very good, or very evil. You've had your personal Holocaust and survived.

I was physically abused as a child by both my parents, but I would consider it mild compared to

what others have experienced. It wasn't sexual. But I did fall into addictions as a way to ease my pain. B"H with the help of this site, and with tremendous syata d'shmaya I am clean. And with my sobriety came a much closer connection to Toras Hashem.

All the suffering wasn't for nothing. I worked hard to become a good husband and father, and am B"H seeing the fruits of these efforts. I have an extra sensitivity to others because of my childhood experiences. I know others who were more severely abused and recovered, and have such a keen sensitivity to the feelings of others, it's an eerie sixth sense. Special training.

It is worth breaking free. Hashem will take your addiction if you ask him, if you turn it over to him. You will be fine without the medicine. You are an adult now. A father. A beloved Jew. Fight the evil with good. You are still a precious lamb, and have a special place reserved, where few can stand, near the Shchina after 120.
