I have a smile for everyone even though I'm in pain. But do you really think I could totally act like someone who isn't hard on himself if that's the way I truly am? It's not possible because even if I think I can imitate I wouldn't really know the behaviors of such a person. To get to the point I have certainly been hard on others too. I always knew that I don't complement my wife and kids enough so I try to deliberately do so when I remember but it doesn't come naturally.
