Bigmoishe I was giving a lot of thought to your point about sacrifice. I remembered

learning how Rabbi Shamhan R' Hirsch and how he defined korban in the Torah. I went back and looked it up. He explained that the word is coming from getting close to Hashem and he did not like the word sacrifice. " The term sacrifice implies the idea of giving something up that is of value to oneself for the benefit of another, or of having to do without something of value, ideas which are not only entirely absent from the nature and idea of a korban but are diametrically opposed to it". ... even suffering itself becomes exalted happiness in the nearness of G-d" He argues that korban comes from the word karov - close to Hashem. by bringing a korban we get closer to Hashem. Since getting close to Hashem is the only thing that is truly good " Kirvas Elokim li tov" everything it takes to get there just pales in comparison. So in terms of getting close to Hashem whatever it takes is nothing in comparison to what we are getting.

Therefore there is no real sacrifice.

That's in the case of pure ruchnuis. Like in not partaking in activities that will or might bring us to lust and therefore distance ourselves from HKBH

However in the case of gashmius. like I will give up my strawberry-shortcake for the joy of losing weight. Perhaps here Rabbi Hirsch would say sacrifice is true -like you said.

For Rav Hirsch, giving up something of gashmiyus was something of absolutely no value.

We, however, have given chashivus to lust. We have idolized the women we chase after; we have made porn and masturbation our sweet escape from the rigors of daily life. We enjoy it. (In a deviation from the classic Dov response, I would dare say that this may even apply to the non-addicts who are caught up with these issues.)

Hence, it is a sacrifice, much as a father who would just like to kick up his feet and relax after a hard day's work, and instead opens a Gemara and learns with his son is sacrificing his relaxation. Does he know with certainty that putting effort into his kids is a better use of his time? Yes. Is it more enjoyable right now to relax? Yes.

I loved the vort that yiraishamaim brought from Rav SR Hirsch although sometimes the word hikriv is used on the actual offerer of the korban keillu hikriv es nafsho, hikriv being a poel yotze which indicates that something is being given away by the giver who isn't the same as the gift so it's not just 'getting' closer which is a poel omed. So all of the understandings derived from the experiences of the ovdei hashem here are true. It is getting closer through paying a worthwhile price. Even for a tzadik like Rav Hirsch there were sacrifices in his level which came to him with yegia. So Bigmoish, I don't know if Dov would say that.
