One of the things that I gained is that I have been fortunate to find a great program in the 12-steps of AA as adopted by SA and others including GYE. I have been able to see my character defects for what they are and I'm able to follow a path to rectify them. I have gained fellowship and a deep understanding of the individual nature of people and their struggles. This has helped me to see the true beauty in people and has enabled me to understand that we all have our difficulties. I do have a question, which you don't have to answer unless you feel like it. It's more food for thought. In your P.S. you wrote that we don't "have a right to stumble intentionally in it." But isn't that exactly what we do? We intentionally engage our behaviors. We open web pages that we know will lead us to "act out", usually with the intent to "act out" and we then proceed to "act out". So what's the difference if we have a right to do it or not? It is in fact what we are doing anyway. Having the right to do it or not having the right to do it has not had any effect on us doing or not thus far.

You may find it interesting to know that for addicts, the admission that we are in fact at a point where we have no bechirah over lust and are powerless over it, is the first step to stopping acting out. Addicts never take this as some kind of a right, privilege or defense of their behavior. The reasoning for this is irrelevant, but what is important is that it works. Imagine if we loved some treife food. Maybe we are baalteshuvah and had it before. Now we go ahead and fast for a day and then we go to the store and buy it. We get home and cook it up just the way we like it. Put it on a plate and sit down at the table and at this point we are going crazy and we eat it. Can we say after that Hashem gave us a test? That's what we do with lust, isn't it? We starve ourselves spiritually and let our anger, jealously, lust and resentments fester. Then we surround ourselves with temptation and build up frustration until we are ready to explode. Then we "fail" and call it a test?
