I just wanted to comment on your reference to movies because that is a big issue for me too and i haven't really seen it discussed a lot here.

I'm going to assume you are referring to "regular" i.e. non-pornographic movies, and for me personally I include secular novels in the same category. I'm struggling to understand how to relate to them. There are many books / movies / TV shows where 99% of the time they have nothing overtly lewd, and are as offensive to shmiras eynayim as going to the post office on a fall day. Sometimes I feel that the main reason why they are bad for me is because they represent a form of escape and I view escapism as the definition of addiction as it relates to me personally.

Actually, I see this as my primary struggle, and here's my shortlist of reasons not to watch movies or read novels:

- 1. x % shmutz even if I do fast forward those parts
- 2. Exposure to a low level of inappropriately dressed women

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3. Cursing / violence 4. Wasting time 5. Escaping 6. The slippery slope to more explicit movies and books, which is a path well trodden. Cords here are some facts not made up stat.
Go to the SA site and click on face to face meetings. Then click on New Jersey. I notice two locations in NJ. Guess where one of the two is? Thats right Lakewood

Next click on NY. The largest variety of options are in Brooklyn and in SA Orange and Rockland County Area, with 4 location options, in monsey, monore, spring valley and perl river.

In maryland Baltimore has by far the largest list.

It is plausibly possible that these areas were chosen simply out of chance. But I would suggest that the areas listed above are highly populated by people living in these areas more than other areas. Generally who lives in Lakewood, Monroe & rockland county? I think many orthdox jews. This all leads me to believe that living an orthdox jewish life does statsictly lead more people into recovery.
