In Devarim(1:37) Moshe tells klal yisroel that "Hashem got angry at me because of you saying

also you cannot go there" (to E"Y). Is that a way to talk to klal yisroel (especially for Moshe Rabeinu!)? It's YOUR FAULT I can't go into E"Y!? What was Moshe telling them?

The Drashos Haran says that Moshe was telling them "Do you know how chashuv you are? Because I said "*shimu na hamorim*", because I didn't have proper kavod for you, Hashem won't let me go into E"Y." He wasn't blaming them. He was telling them how chashuv they are in the eyes of the RBS"O.

Hashem loves you so much and is makpid on your kavod! So much so, that all my tefillos didn't help. My tefillos can help for the most serious of aveiros, but when I don't give you the proper kavod - nothing helps!

Now, Klal Yisroel did their fair share of aveiros. They failed 10 tests. At one point, Hahsem wanted to destroy them (by the egel). In contrast, Moshe Rabeinu was close to perfect. He was almost a malach.

It doesn't matter. That is how much Hashem loves us!

Hashem loves us unconditionally, and there is nothing we can do to make Him stop.

At the end of last week's parsha, we are told to destroy Amalek. At the beginning of this week's parsha, we are taught about the mitzvah of Bikurim. What is the connection?

The Makkos and Kriyas Yam Suf were the greatest displays of Hashems power and hashgocho

pratis in the history of the world (so far). Amalek is the one nation that denies Hashem and claims that it is all happenstance. They can see the biggest nes and not so much as yawn.

A tree grows fruit year after year. Hardly a supernatural occurrence. Yet, Klal Yisroel brings this fruit to the Beis Hamikdash and makes a declaration that "my father was an arami, he went down to Mitzrayim... we became a great nation, you took us out of Mitzrayim, you brought us to Eretz Yisroel, and now I bring this fruit that you gave me..."

We take the most mundane of occurrences and see the Hand of Hashem planning and leading us to this moment for hundreds of years prior! Perfect Hashgocho!
