However, in regard to number 2, I wouldn't consider it a slip if someone saw something by mistake and then got a little bit carried away and kept looking at it, or even if someone saw a link and couldn't resist clicking on it but then catches themselves within a few seconds. These

type of things do not have to be considered a slip. Only if someone decides to actively pursue viewing bad sites Chas veshalom, that would be considered a slip.

Also, I like MDM's choice number #5 as well, along with Jack's explanation. In other words, besides for the two things mentioned above, anyone can set their own criteria for what they consider a slip. But as long as they did not do one of the two things above, they can stay on the chart if they want.

From my understanding, I think that there is some confusion here. Maybe Elya will clarify.

My understanding was that the above mentioned is called "falls" not slips. When you go beyond your cut off, i.e. you will not be motzei L'vataleh, and you did.....this is a fall and you start the chart at the beginning. If you only started masturbating and then stopped before the motzei.....this is a "slip", and you do not fall off of the charts.

If for you viewing porn intentionally is the bottom, then if you only viewed in unintentionally, this would be a slip, not a FALL (unless you didn't stop).

so "slips" are either, we did something unintentionally, or we began to do something wrong, but we didn't go all of the way. We stopped ourselves. These are slips, and we stay on the charts.

But, when we went all of the way....even once, this is a fall, and we start all over again.

2) The second Geder (din) is slipping below a self set standard. L'Mashal: If I was mekabel on myself not to do a certain thing (let's say "gaze" at women in the street for more than a second) and I failed at my self imposed thing and took a second glance at an attractive female in front of me in line etc. This shouldnt require a new counting, at least not for the first offense.

The first Geder is a fall. the second geder is a slip.
