Ideally we need only Hashem. Realistically we need much more than that. I think many mussar sefarim follow this mehalech. They teach you the right direction. Reach for loving and trusting Hashem for everything that you need, but don't neglect that your humanity requires you to be you. And Hashem is the one who made you that way.

Validation becomes a problem when you absolutely need it / can't function without it. Wanting or appreciating it is a whole different story. Yes, we can work to wean ourselves away from it, but it's not k'neged bitachon. They can work together. Be the balance that keeps you mentally healthy and growing.

Good morning. I didn't mean to get up this early but my sleep quality hasn't been great lately, I only got like three-four hours in last night...

Anyways, I'm going to try to rewrite my post from yesterday that got lost. Here goes:

I want to share with all of you the sense of joy and gratitude that I am cultivating within myself. It is not a joy or gratitude based on physical circumstances or personal achievements. Rather, it's source is in an enduring and unchanging spiritual idea. I don't know whether I'm a baal madreiga for being able to draw joy from the following idea, but I do think everyone reading this can gain something from it.

In the 33rd chapter of Tanya, after discussing various forms of sadness and presenting one way to deal with it, the Alter Rebbe provides a second Hisbonenus which is meant to bring a person to Simcha, regardless of his physical or spiritual circumstances. But first, the Alter Rebbe summarizes one of the fundamental tenets of his philosphy-that Hashem is transcendent and immanenet, and that nowhere is void of his presence (this idea obviously has sources in classical Torah and Kabbalah, but the Alter Rebbe really developed it into a concrete and coherent philosphy).

After explaining this, he concludes (I will include the parts I find most relevant, though I highly recommend reading the whole perek in the original. Below I will include a link to the perek with an English translation):

Have a wonderful Shabbos

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To summarize in English: If we truly understand the constant presence of Hashem in our lives, we will be much more joyous then a person who wins the lottery. It is the greatest gift a person can receive, and we have it constantly, for free...

In recent days I have been working very hard to internalize this idea and integrate it within my life. I have seen more success then I ever imagined. I now feel like I can deal with any challenge that comes my way with the energy and vitality I draw from this idea.

The Baal Shem Tov concluded: "I want to bring Jews to the point that they will yield the kind of harvest that G?d's 'cherished land' can yield."
